This beautifully written story layers the complexities of history, culture, and immigration together with the story of a family on the verge of bursting apart.



Mrs. Sherlock Holmes by Brad Ricca: The true story of Grace Humiston, a female lawyer and detective in New York City at the turn of the 20th century who provides pro bono legal services to the disenfranchised: immigrants, laborers, and women. A tenacious sleuth, she solves multiple "cold" cases, most famously the case of a missing girl named Ruth Cruger. A fast-paced page-turner, Brad Ricca's well researched storytelling reads like a Victorian crime novel.
